
THE C.M. RUSSELL HERITAGE AWARD PRESENTED TO JACK GLADSTONE

The annual Heritage Award recognizes those who have made a significant contribution to the legacy, culture, life, and country of Russell's West.


Regarded as a cultural bridge builder, Jack Gladstone delivers programs nationally on American Indian mythology and history. In a career spanning three decades, Jack has produced fifteen critically acclaimed CDs. In 1985, Jack co-founded "Native America Speaks," an award-winning lecture series for Glacier National Park. Most recently, Jack received the prestigious "Best Historical Recording" from the Native American Music Association.

Jack will be leading off *The Russell* live auction on Saturday, March 16, at the Best Western Heritage Inn at 6 p.m. with his song "When the Land Belonged to God," the title of one of Charles Russell's masterpieces. Before the live auction starts, Jack will introduce a paddle raise for the museum's education department. These funds are intended for increased outreach by the museum and increased access to the museum by all constituents.

The Heritage Award may be given in several areas, including history, literature, preservation, music, and the arts. The 2010 inaugural award was presented to Ian Tyson, a singer/songwriter



The 2011 recipient was Red Steagall of Fort Worth, Texas. Steagall is a Western poet, singer, songwriter, and performer who has spent his life promoting the cowboy way of life. He was inducted into the Great Westerner's Hall of Fame in 2003. The 2012 recipient was Dr. Rick Stewart, former director and curator of Western paintings and sculpture at the Amon Carter Museum of American Art in Fort Worth and curator of Romance Maker: The Watercolors of Charles M. Russell.
